Duties: to develop and implement the highest levels of clinical management and utilization review services including authorizing and monitoring inpatient, outpatient and intermediate levels of care related to mental health and substance abuse treatment for Point of Service, HMO, and medical assistant HMO patients. Development and application of clinical criteria to determine medical necessity and appropriateness of care; interact with physicians, social-workers, and psychiatric advisors to discuss clinical/authorization questions and concerns regarding specific cases. Developed and implemented parent information groups for the community. Community work included consultant to middle and high schools providing staff training and development of prevention and intervention programs; liaison with parole and probation, social services, and community hospitals. Served on Bowie Alcohol-Drug Awareness Committee (BADGE) with other youth service providers in the community.

Peer reviews are arranged and conducted by telephone at the provider's chosen time. Written reports with clinical information review recommendations/decision are faxed back to the appropriate agency. Average 30-35 reviews per month.
